Good Words to Describe your Outcomes

Remember that your outcomes will almost always start with some word that shows a shift or a change in some contributing factor or behavior (for example, “An increase in the knowledge of...,” or “A decrease in the number of binge drinking episodes.”).

So think of first:

- 1.) Is there (or do you want to create) an INCREASE or DECREASE

Then:

- 2.) Decide which contributing factor you are trying to increase or decrease (look at the following list of common factors to see if one of these fits)

Then:

- 3.) Provide a description of the factor (for example, “Increase knowledge [of what],” or “Decrease influence [or what or whom]”.)
